Advocating for Children

Dr. Frank Chiachiere, a trustee on the Valley Stream UFSD Thirteen and Valley Stream CHSD Boards of Education, was selected as a lobbyist to represent Nassau County school districts when he joined several hundred school board members from across the nation in Washington, D.C. The purpose of their trip was to attend workshops on effective advocacy, meet with veteran lobbyists who have met with Congress in the past and advocate and raise awareness about issues of importance to Long Island schools. While in Washington, Dr. Chiachiere met with Sens. Charles Schumer and Kirsten Gillibrand and Rep. Gregory Meeks.

Dr. Chiachiere used the opportunity to discuss several issues of importance to Long Island schools, including: the devastating

financial impact of the federal sequestration to school districts; opposition to further expansion of charter schools and expanded implementation of standardized assessments; the reauthorization of the Elementary and Secondary Education Act and Early Childhood Education; and federal laws which authorize Congress to provide federal funds for programs. He also discussed No Child Left Behind, the impact of unfunded/underfunded mandates and the ongoing struggle faced by Long Island school districts to create budgets that support quality education without overburdening the taxpayers.

"It was an honor to represent Valley Stream and other Long Island school districts in Washington, D.C.," stated Dr. Chiachiere.

Ducklings Are Born

Howell Road Elementary School students culminated their science curriculum with a firsthand observance of the life cycle of ducks.

First-grade teacher Danielle Vitulli arranged for the delivery of fertile duck eggs. All four first-grade classrooms set up incubators using glass tanks and gooseneck lamps with incandescent bulbs. Students read about the birth process using science journals available in the classroom.



The first part of the lesson involved diligent care to maintain the required temperature and environment for the eggs. Using elements of the Common Core Learning Standards, students utilized their reading, math, research and observation skills. Eleven of the 12 eggs successfully hatched.

Students were taught the proper methods for feeding, maintaining and handling the ducklings to help the birds maintain their wild instincts. Each room was equipped with a small swimming pool for the ducks to enjoy during feeding time. This hands-on science experience enabled students to observe the rapid physical growth of the ducklings.

The healthy birds were turned over to a local farm for proper care until they are mature enough for safe release.

Generations United

It was a meeting of generations as the James A. Dever Elementary School Community Service Committee sponsored its 16th annual Seniors Meet Juniors concert and brunch. Senior community residents, along with other senior relatives of Dever students, were invited to enjoy a concert performed by the very talented James A. Dever band, chorus, jazz ensemble and orchestra. The students presented carnations to their senior guests and served as escorts for the event. The concert music was entrhralling and captivated both seniors and students alike.



Senior guests listened with rapt enthusiasm to "A String of Pearls," which many remembered from Glenn Miller's Big Band era, while the juniors moved in their seats to the "The Incredibles," composed by Michael Giacchino and heard a moving rendition of "Home," composed by Alan Chang, Michael Bubl  and Amy Foster-Gillies. Following the concert, the appreciative guests enjoyed a sumptuous brunch courtesy of the PTA. The seniors expressed their appreciation for being included in a tradition that reminded everyone that music is the common thread that unites regardless of age.

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An Important Lesson on Internet Safety

All Valley Stream UFSD Thirteen sixth-grade students gathered in the auditorium of James A. Dever Elementary School to participate in a serious Internet and social media safety lecture conducted by an FBI Special Agent.

The message was direct and clear. A slideshow with several video clips depicted the ramifications of letting down one's guard with online predators. Students were warned to be careful about sharing their personal information, particularly in social media forums. The presenter went on to warn students of the lasting problems created by the foolhardy posting of photos, videos and other private information. Following the presentation, students had the opportunity to ask questions and share their experiences.



Words and Strategies to Learn By

The district's theme for the 2012-2013 school year was ACE (Academics, Communication and Emotional Learning). As an extension of that theme, a district vocabulary word and learning strategy was highlighted each month, both in the classroom and for use during in-home reading and activities. As part of the introduction of the Common Core Learning Standards, the words and strategies were selected to improve learning, expand students' vocabulary and to enhance students' reading comprehension. Classroom lessons incorporated both the words and the learning strategies, while parents were also encouraged to use these learning tools at home to reinforce and expand upon what was being taught in the classroom. Beautiful Me PROGRAM

Beautiful Me is a program designed to educate females by promoting appreciation for their genuine qualities, accurate self-awareness and the satisfaction achieved from helping others. The program was provided by the Hance Family Foundation in memory of their three daughters Emma, Alyson and Katie.

The Beautiful Me program consists of three one-hour sessions designed around three core content areas: Emma's Example, Alyson's Art and Katie's Kindness. The teacher guides conversations to also include important friendship-building skills and key concepts necessary for building positive self-esteem.

Forty-nine district teachers volunteered to be trained by the Hance Family Foundation. This program will continue next year.

Working Together to Prevent Bullying

Throughout the school year, anti-bullying initiatives take place districtwide. Character education is an integral component of the daily curriculum that teaches students self-respect, respect for others and provides the tools to prevent bullying.

One such program that teaches students how to become bully prevention activists is "No Name Calling Week" held in each of the four elementary schools. The program reminds students that bullying and name calling are always the wrong choices and teaches them how to make the right choices. During "No Name Calling Week," morning announcements include a topical thought for the day, which can lead to further classroom discussion. This program, along with others, provides students with the lifelong skills needed to stop bullying and stay safe.
